The ReUNITA Alliance has had a significant impact on the University of Turin, representing a key opportunity to develop innovative and interdisciplinary research programmes at the European level.

The University of Torino took full advantage of the project activities, especially in the WP3 and WP4 tasks, to improve its research structures and strategies.

Through the creation of a network of shared infrastructures (WP4), the University of Turin was not only able to strengthen its own research capacity but also to benefit from the constant comparison with the Alliance partners' operational methods. Based on the experience in UNITA, UNITO has launched its own program to strengthen the Research Infrastructures (Infrastructure Innovation Worksite) and to network them which will have important repercussions on the Alliance in a logic of sharing best practices.

This exchange of expertise and best practices proved invaluable in optimising the management of infrastructure resources and enhancing the efficiency of its systems.

In WP3, which is dedicated to human capital, the University of Turin benefited greatly from activities aimed at supporting the growth of researchers and promoting greater attention to gender equality.

The Mentoring Programme, a practice recognised at the European and international level, was designed to support the careers of young male and female researchers by providing the university with concrete ideas for implementing more inclusive and targeted professional development policies.

These results have set the foundations for the consolidation of the Alliance and offered the University of Turin a solid platform on which to build new paths of growth, continuous improvement and internationalisation of research.

The RE UNITA project has consistently contributed to increasing the alliance's cohesion from the perspective of ensuring the best institutional premises for scientific research, in correlation with the ERA and EHEA principles. Thus, groups of researchers were structured to promote participation in joint research projects and common interdisciplinarity approaches were defined. UVT managed, through this project, to mark major progress towards implementing the HRS4R. Also, exciting sessions ensuring key skills for the professional development of PhD students, researchers and research staff, at all stages of their careers were carried out. A centralization of the research infrastructure was established and promoted and procedures by which UNITA researchers can use it jointly were implemented. The publication in the Open Science regime was rewarded. A multipolar virtual campus was created to enhance the transfer of research results to the economic environment. Numerous Living labs and open seminars addressed to NGOs and authorities took place, and innovative events promoting the concept of Citizen Science were implemented.
